ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Many thanks to those members who attended the GCHA AGM at St Michael's Centre, Abergavenny on 8th June.

Tony Hopkins began proceedings with an excellent talk on the Llanerch Colliery disaster of 1890. Tony has retired as County Archivist, although he will still be working part time at the Archives, and to mark the occasion he was presented with a small gift.

In her report, our Chair, Gill Wakley, reported as follows:

'The committee have been discussing the purpose of the organisation now that all the volumes of the Gwent County History have been published. Our main aim will continue to be publication, including the Gwent Local History Journal and other publications as considered appropriate. This would include encouraging people to research and publish the results. The role of the Monmouthshire Antiquary was recognised and our association would continue to liaise with them in order to avoid duplication of roles. Applications for publication of monographs on subjects of local interest are considered by the committee.

Another important role is providing a forum, the Gwent Local History Council, for local history societies to meet and exchange information. We would like to encourage any other history societies within Gwent who do not currently send a representative to join this forum, which the present members find very helpful. Knowledge is exchanged about good speakers (and the not so good!) and is vital to the continuance of societies. Information about organisational matters is also helpful. A useful role for this organisation was demonstrated by the co-operation of many groups in making the Newport Commemoration of the Armistice in

November so successful.

Peter Strong has compiled a contents list for the journal for the years subsequent to those now on line (which are, of course, searchable) and this is available on the website. Any offers to make a searchable index would be welcome! The Journal has a circulation list of around 186 and we usually aim to print around 220, with larger numbers for commemorative editions which sell extra copies. Although our website receives quite a large number of visitors – e.g. 2,100 in February – it does need improvement and we are looking into the best way forward for this.'

Officers and committee members were re-elected, with the addition of Byron Grubb, who joins the committee.

RICHARD HUTCHINGS



A CHANGE OF ATTITUDE

News that Rogerstone Community Council is erecting a copy of the famous Chartist Mosaic that once graced an entrance to John Frost Square in Newport has been widely welcomed by local historians. Such a positive attitude to local history did not always prevail. According to the *South Wales Weekly Argus* (19th March 1955) when Rogerstone Parish Council received a request to send a representative to Monmouthshire Local History Council, the request was rejected, with one councillor declaring that 'Our job is to make history, not write it,' while another 'doubted whether Monmouthshire had any history.' Thankfully, wiser counsels now prevail.
